ASSOCIATION NEWS

FROM THE SEPTEMBER GENERAL MEETING

Chair Craig McDowall called the meeting to order with 21 voting members, 2 spouses, 1 staff and 3 guests present. As this did not constitute a quorum, no official business was conducted

- **Craig** reported as **President that** he meets with the Operations Team at the park every Tuesday, then as required with Gord and staff regarding planning for major events and other issues. Management and staff are doing a good job up there. Park rentals are up and so are the rates. Another movie shoot is almost confirmed. In addition Polar ticket sales are doing very well using Social Media without need for TV or other forms of traditional media advertising. Facebook and Instagram ads are the new norm.
- Craig & Christian teamed up on Railway Operations advising that air conditioning has been repaired on two coaches with the rest scheduled for completion before DOWT depending on the work required. Bill Marchant gave a brief update on #960 highlighting the need to replace one window as the result of damage caused while grinding protrusions in the cab. The rear hood is now fitted after a little tweaking. All other work is going well.
- **David** presented financials in absentia reporting total revenue ytd July 31 was \$926k, almost the same as 2015. Loss of revenue from the *Henry Pickering* lease (\$35k) was offset by movie revenue of \$50k. Expenses were well controlled @ \$90k less than L/Y. The ytd deficit = \$123k T/Y vs \$209k L/Y.
- Gord also reported in absentia that the Heritage Park in September saw 8 important events at the CN Roundhouse & Conference Centre raising much needed funds for operation. This included our first 100% in-house catered private event using the Park's own team and kitchen.
- As requested by the Board, time has been spent recently on developing a new website strategy. **Jenn** has been tasked to make the existing website more friendly. Design work is also proceeding on a separate CN Roundhouse & Conference Centre site with the build starting early October.
- Ticket sales for events are going well with 704 tickets sold to date for the Mystery of the Magic Pumpkin Train (incl. our first ever Vancouver School). Thanks to Craig, Robert and Christian, Polar Express tickets are almost 1/3 sold. Volunteers are needed to staff the event. Contact **Zoe** if you can help.
- Gord closed by listing projects the Park would like to complete during the fall weather dependent.
- Ken started his Fundraising Report with recent Grant Application activity; The McLean Foundation has indicated allocation of \$5k towards Experiential Learning; BC Heritage awarded \$10k to *Northern Summit* Restoration; Canada Cultural Spaces is our reviewing request to support the MP2 acquisition and a decision is expected soon from GNRHS regarding assistance with cosmetic restoration of Transfer Caboose BN 11474 as GN X-180.

- Ken gave an update on the October 5th Gala ... all logistics are complete however the task of marketing it and selling tickets continues.
- Planning continues towards the development of the Telegraph Memorial Park ... next step is to confirm regulatory requirements meanwhile brochure preparation under way.
- Work continues on the development of the WCRA Patron Program.
- Funding for the semaphore installation is nearly complete. Work is proceeding on schedule for the 6520 restoration but additional funding is needed.

GN 1090 REPORT

GN 1090 Sept 30 Work UpdateI have made another wonderful discovery on the 1090. While putting the tarps on to keep the car dry for the winter I discovered that the ends of the roof are sheathed in copper. This is similar too the SP&S 218 at the Northwest Railway Museum in Washington State.

BCER 960 REPORT

So, now that we've all had a great summer, it's time to get really back to work on our demanding 960. Not that we haven't put in a number of hard days the past couple months, so here's an update..

The focus has been and remains the final fitting of steel panels, doors, and hardware on the rear hood. The left rear drop door was proving problematic at an earlier stage, so it was switched out for the right front, and this door certainly fell into place nicely. But oops, major modifications to the three latch fittings, door to side of hood, were going to be needed to have this door work

effectively. The mods would have been potentially an ugly distortion with questionable operation. So, we dropped in again the proper door for the left rear, and with some grinding here and there, and a slight lift of the right rear of the hood, (bless the 10 ton overhead crane) the proper door finally fell into its opening as it should. At one point, we had one door hanging down on hinges and the proper door sitting in its opening, sort of a two door thing for the left rear hood. I'm told this goes with restorations when you try to match up old original pieces with newly fabricate plating, aaaagh. We're now on the right track for finishing off this aspect, with new hinges plus latch mechanisms coming together plus paint priming touch up scheduled.



On the same left rear side we've had to remove the engineers window glazing. Apparently when we were doing a little grinding to better fit hood to a side panel, the white hot sparks actually embedded into the tempered safety glass. One couldn't much notice until you ran your hand over the face of the glass, rough on hands and would certainly shred wiper blades... Another frustrating mistake, as we mistakenly thought everything was bouncing off this glass, but thankfully, our generous glazier cut us another piece in short order.

Peter Layland spared us some time away from working on brakes at the FVHR, so we completed installation of the replacement break piping pieces up through the 960s steel pan, which involved a good deal of top and bottom alignment work. We now have to set in place dozens of the refurbished piping brackets. The bottom angle new fabrication pieces for the front hood are dry fit in place, we now simply need a welder on hand.

By end of November we aim to have rear hood painting completed, new glazing replaced and more advances with the brake hardware.

NEW HERITAGE RESTORATIONS DEBUT AT BILLY MINER DAYS

The West Coast Railway Heritage Park isn't just about trains, it also focuses on the stories of how the railways established communities here in Western British Columbia and the types of community activities that grew up as our towns became established. And so it was, that as the CN Roundhouse & Conference Centre was transformed into the "saloon", the area also debuted of some new operating artifacts.

Outside the saloon entrance was a working forge, restored by **David Walmsley** with the help of Brodie, who created butter knives on the forge from base steel for the guests who attended the function. This was the first time it has been fired up for the public and it was quite something to watch.

Inside the entry, the first thing you came upon was Mamie's Wash House, where **Cat** operated and demonstrated the 1929 Maytag wringer washer and washed anyone's clothes who needed it! Again, it was a great live demo of this restored piece of home equipment, that normally resides in the wash house beside the Brightbill Heritage House.

And then, there was the Print Shop—our vintage printing press restored to operation and setup, with **Zoe Cilliers** turning out Billy Miner posters for guests. The printing press also created our thank you cards which were used at the Gala on October. (photos)

FEATURE ARTICLES

FROM THE STEAM CHEST—OCTOBER 1961 PART 1 - with thanks to Craig McDowall

BCER

In a lightning move on August 3rd the B.C. Government took over the British Columbia Electric Co. which included the B.C. Electric Railway. What will happen to the railway is now a huge question mark. Many rumours are going around with the most popular being that it would become part of the Pacific Great Eastern. To date, the day to day railway operations haven't changed. (Ed. Note—it became the BC Hydro Railway)

Rapid Transit for Vancouver?

This question was raised by the BC Government's Highways Minister Phil Gaglardi when he said a rapid transit system would be better for Vancouver than a freeway system of highways.

This has been discussed by various municipal levels of government and the funds for a survey have now been approved. Several points in favour of a rapid transit system would be that it takes up less space than a freeway, would pay for itself and would be faster than any freeway. Freeways don't make money and would deprive the city of valuable taxable downtown property. The original suggestion would be to use the currently abandoned rights of way of the BCER interurban lines and the currently little used freight lines still operated by the BCER. Plans indicate that this rapid rail system could be in place by 1969-1970.

CNR

On September 5th, caboose #76279 came out the CNR's Port Mann shops carrying the new 'wet noodle' insignia. The car was painted the normal CNR orange but this was just to use up existing paint stock! Future repainting will be in the new 'red-orange' colour to match the noses of the repainted diesel units.

Passenger diesel B unit #6616 also showed up in September in the 'toothpaste' scheme

CNR 2-8-0 #2165 and 0-6-0 #7396 were sent from Mirror, Alberta to Edmonton early this summer en route to Winnipeg for scrapping. The engines remained in Edmonton for a little while and it wasn't until Sept. 8th that they headed east to Winnipeg along with 4-6-2's #5104 & #5117, all in a way freight. At the same time, 2-8-0 #2164 was in the Edmonton 9th Street Roundhouse waiting to get her running gear greased and then sent east to be scrapped.

4-6-2 #5114 will run a fan trip out of Edmonton to Camrose and the excursion is planned for October 28th by the Northern Alberta Model Railway Club. If the trip is a success, #5114 will probably be retained for some other trips in the spring next year. This locomotive traveled to Athabaska Alberta on August 31st for an official city celebration just after receiving a quick inspection and fresh paint. When she returned a few days later, she was put on temporary static display near the CNR freight offices.

2-8-0 #2141 arrived at Port Mann from Victoria on August 28th and during the next two weeks was given a quick 'once over' and a new coat of paint and then sent to Kamloops on September 15th to be placed on display at the city park near the Thompson River.

0-6-0's #7413 ,based in Drumheller, and #7362, based in Hanna Alberta, were sent to Saskatoon during August en route to the CNR Transcona shops in Winnipeg to be scrapped.

Grand Trunk Western diesel #73 was scrapped at Battle Creek Michigan this past spring. She had been in storage there for the past year or so.

Pacific Great Eastern

A very rare occurrence took place on Sept. 2nd when a five car Budd RDC train was operated out of North Vancouver. This sold out train was a result of the long Labour Day weekend and a special rail fan party aboard. Four cars had been scheduled but the fifth one was added at the last minute due to the passenger load. The train departed with standing room only with some passengers situated in the baggage sections of the RDC-3 units! As the PGE only has six RDC's, this left only one unit to cover the southbound train from Prince George to Lillooet (where three cars of the northbound train were dropped off to meet the southbound RDC).

Work bunk car #X-120 was tipped over and burned at Squamish during September. This car, former baggage car #701, began life as Oregon Electric baggage motor car #952. She is the first of the old OE baggage motor cars to be scrapped.

The passenger car situation has remained fairly static this past year. Sleeper 'Clinton' (ex Indiana Public Service) has been in storage at Squamish along with ex Gas-electric car #1800. X-110 (former diner #651) has not been seen in Squamish lately and is believed now scrapped. And Gas-electric #107 has been placed in storage at Squamish pending her fate. Elsewhere, the other ex Indiana sleepers 'Pavillion' and 'Barkerville' are based in Prince George in service on the Prince George-Chetwynd mixed train. The three ex Pullman 'Lake' sleepers are all at North Vancouver along with the ex MILW coaches. Some of these coaches are used on the weekly mixed North Van to Lillooet train . Business cars 'Cariboo' (ex GN open end observation A-5) and 'Northern Summit' are usually located in North Vancouver when not in use. Open observation car#14 is under shelter at Squamish.

Diesel #590 was in an accident on Sept. 9th at Milepost 23 when she left the rails and went over the side of an embankment. The engine stopped about 30 feet short of Howe Sound and after a week's salvage work was finally recovered and sent to Squamish for repairs.

Ceylon names locomotive 'Vancouver'

The government of Ceylon asked the City of Vancouver in September for a photo of the city

crest to they could place a plaque on a locomotive they were about to name 'Vancouver'. The city agreed to provide the plaque as a goodwill gesture. The locomotive had been bought with funds provided by the Canadian sponsored 'Columbo Plan'.


A VISIT TO THE WINNIPEG RAILWAY MUSEUM - by Don Evans

A recent trip took us to Winnipeg for a conference, and while there we had a bit of a chance to explore the city a bit. Of course, a visit to Union Station was in the cards, and while there a visit to the Winnipeg Railway Museum which is housed on tracks one and two in the station.

The museum has a significant collection, the most famous piece being the Countess of Dufferin steam locomotive—CPR #1. The little 4-4-0 was built in 1872 by M Baird & Co. in Pennsylvania, and came to CPR contractor Joseph Whitehead in 1877 at Winnipeg. The loco was used in building the CPR east to the lakehead, south to Pembina and west to Golden, BC and then was transferred to the CPR becoming their #151. She now is exhibited as CPR #1 recognizing her unique role in the original construction of the railway.



CNR GMD-1 #1900 is the first of this model built by GMDD in London Ontario in 1957. A uniquely Canadian locomotive, these were owned only by CNR and Northern Alberta Railway. It is exhibited with its engine doors open, revealing the 12 cylinder GM 567 power unit that generates 1200 hp.

CN heavyweight combine #7188 was converted from a Colonist car in 1955 and is a sister to WCRA's car CN 7186. The car serves as the museum's gift shop as well as an exhibit.

RAILWAY NEWS

Amtrak Cascades train 516 of September 27, 2016 arrived very late into Vancouver due a grade crossing collision by a BNSF freight ahead of it. The train, consisted of locomotive Amtrak P42 #146 had the Talgo consist of cars 7103, 7416, 7417, 7419, 7522, 7503, 7553, 7453, 7901 and cab car 90340. The train passed Slocan Street at 0208 and arrived at Pacific Central station approx. 0245 on Wednesday, September 28. (J.M.)

Following up on last month's report on **CP SD40-2's**, we have reports of CP #5824 still operating in the local area, handling the Ashcroft—Kamloops turn in late September and early October. (J.M.)

Rocky Mountaineer had a mishap on it's northbound train September 23 when it derailed both locomotives (8015 / 8017) at a switch at Glen on the CP line. None of the train consist was derailed and no one was hurt. In typical Rocky Mountaineer fashion a full recovery was launched....buses were dispatched from Kamloops to rescue all stranded passengers and get them to Kamloops where they were to overnight anyways. The two locomotives were rerailed and backed to CN Thornton for inspection and repairs, and another entire consist was deadheaded from Vancouver to Kamloops. The train departed a bit late from Kamloops next morning with all guests on board to complete their journey as scheduled. (Various sources)

SkyTrain has started putting its new Mark III cars in service. The new cars, numbered in the 400 series, were seen testing on the Expo line October 1 and in service by October 6. (R.E.)



Panama City. Work started in 2011 in the city's historic *Cinco de Mayo Plaza* on the \$1.6bil first of four phases plan. This section, completed on 5 April 2014 included 13 stations on an 8.7mi (14km) route running from the densely populated *San Miguelito* Municipality to *Albrook bus station*. The fares on this stretch started at 35 cents, but are expected to raise to \$1 when the second line opens by the end of 2018, which will add an additional 14mi and 17 stations. The project is being built by a consortium of France's *Alstom*, Brazil's *Norberto Ode-brecht* and Spain's *Fomento de Construcciones y Contratas*.




