
PGE 561 AT WORK AGAIN

BC ELECTRIC RAILWAY "CONNAUGHT" MAKES ITS RETURN DEBUT - by Don Evans

September 9, 2017 was a dull rainy day in Cloverdale, but that didn't dampen the spirits in any way as the Fraser Valley Heritage Railway Society unveiled their restoration of BC Electric Railway interurban car 1304—Connaught.

In September 1912, Canada's Governor General, Prince Arthur- the Duke of Connaught, toured the Lower Mainland. He used BCER car 1304, a near new "Valley Car", which was designed to handle the long runs from Vancouver to Chilliwack. Car 1304 was refitted and freshly painted for the occasion, with the name Connaught on the sides of the car in gold. Inside, the car was luxuriously outfitted for the special tour.

Following the tour, 1304 was returned to transit service and resumed its regular dutues as an interurban car on the Valley line. In 1945, on a deadhead move back from Chilliwack, a fire broke out in 1304—the last car on a three car train—and completely gutted the car. However, still good from the floor down, BC Electric rebuilt the car at its Kitsilano shops and it returned it to service all shiny and new again.

After service on the Valley Line ended in 1950, the Connaught continued service on the Central Park line and lasted to the end of interurban service. It was then acquired by a trolley museum in Oregon until being repatriated to Canada in 2009. Now, after some 16,000 volunteer hours over five years, the car is once again returning to service—this time in Cloverdale.

By 11:00AM on September 9, guests are assembling to witness the ceremonies to launch the car Connaught for its next generation of service. Many dignitaries are present, including a very special guest, Her Honour the Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia, Judith Guichon. Master of Ceremonies **Don Evans** calls the event to order, and the dignitaries are piped to the station deck for the official words. The Lieutenant Governor makes her remarks, and then asks the Director of Operations to summon the Connaught for its symbolic first arrival at the station. BCER 1304 Connaught appears around the curve to the east of the station and rolls up to the platform, powered by Parrish & Heimbecker TP 56 #5601. (Photo page 16) A succession of Federal, Provincial and Municipal dignitaries provide comments and then, the official party and some very special guests board the car for its first trip.

These special guests are a story in their own right. The "Yarrow Riders", Miss Fowlie's Grade Three class, were the last group to ride the car back in1955! Miss Fowlie, the teacher, wrote to BC Electric President Dal Grauer and requested the car so her class could take a



ride, even though service had ended five years earlier and the overhead wires had long since been removed. Grauer said yes—and the class got their ride on the BCER—car 1304 Connaught powered by a BC Electric Diesel locomotive! So here we are in 2017, and the Yarrow Riders are out in force, and fill the car for the first ride all these years later!

Following the ride a lunch was served in the FVHRS Carbarn and some final thank yous were offered to supporters and others. At 1330, the Lieutenant Governor party departed and the crowd thinned as things wound down.

For electric railway preservation it was a great day, and congratulations are due the Fraser Valley group for the great job they are doing at preserving the BC Electric railway interurban story. On September 9 three restored cars are on site—BCER 1207, 1225, and 1304 with a fourth car, 1231 coming soon from the former Downtown Historic Railway in Vancouver.

The FVHRS site in Cloverdale, with its Cloverdale Station, carbarns and grounds are well worth a visit. Interurban car rides happen weekends through the season, check their website for operating dates. There are also plenty of exhibits to see along with speeder rides and other attractions. While in the area, the Surrey Museum and the BC Truck Museum facilities are also nearby.

FROM WCRA NEWS—JULY 1979

BCR

The old Australian Creek wooden trestle 20 miles north of Quesnel will finally be dismantled. The 20 year old trestle was replaced two years ago when a route re-alignment involved a culvert and a fill crossing of the creek.

Work continues on re-ballasting the mainline between Kelly Lake (MP 203) and Williams Lake (MP 299). Work is about 50% complete and involves 60 men and is costing \$3,750,00 and will replace 25,000 ties.

BC Rail is currently leasing six C424's from CN. The units include #3209, 3214, 3216, 3232, 3237 and 3239.

BC Rail experienced two major wrecks recently. On May 20th, the Prince George south yard switcher collided head on with a bridge transfer run. Three RS10's were damaged (#579, 581 & 583). #575 was also involved but not damaged. Then on May 27th, the northbound MacKenzie local with four units derailed due to a washout at MP 551. Moderately damaged were units #632, 641 and 803 while #574 suffered major damage.

Canadian National

CN has a number of new diesels including 9 SD40-2's for late delivery in December, 30 SD40-2's for delivery in second quarter 1980 and 9 M420's for late 1980 delivery. The railway has also ordered 16 slug units for early 1980 delivery.

The last Green/Gold Geep, a GP 9 #4500, is the only one still on the roster, as both sister units #4550 & 4551 on the Central Vermont have now been repainted into the new CV green paint scheme.

A derailment ten kilometres west of Vanderhoof blocked the Prince George to Prince Rupert line on Sunday, August 12th. Twenty cars of a 81 car freight left the tracks when a wheel broke. The line was re-opened 24 hours later although final clean up will take some time yet due to cargo spillage (lumber and aluminum).

Canadian Pacific

The E & N on Vancouver Island continues to sport a variety of power assignments. Spotted at Wellcox (Nanaimo) on July 26th were Baldwin switcher #7070 and chop nosed GP9 #8530. In addition, the BC Government's Museum train was there with ex CPR #3716 on the head end

prior to heading for a July 28th opening in Courtenay.

CP's annual car rebuilding program will continue this year by refurbishing and upgrading over 6000 freight cars and 172 cabooses. Work will be done at three locations: Montreal, Winnipeg and Calgary. CP's current fleet consists of approximately 69,000 freight cars and 450 cabooses.

CP Rail has started a full scale investigation to probe suspected arson fires on company property in BC. Fires include tool sheds, etc up to more serious cases such as a trestle fire in Matsqui and the station in Slocan. A total of six fires this year to date with seven others last year. Some are suspected to be set to disguise theft.

'Hot box' detectors with digital light display have been installed along the CP mainline between Calgary and Medicine Hat. The boards are located every 30 miles and indicate to tail end crews a count of any hot boxes detected as the train passes.

Chop-nosed GP9 #8619 was leased to Crown Zellerbach on Vancouver Island in late June.

CP will take delivery of SD40's #5915-5949 in fall of this year.

VIA Rail

The train washing operations resumed again on July 25th at CP Rail's Drake Street yard with the arrival of The Canadian that day. The washer had not been used for some months previously for reasons unknown. The re-activation was somewhat of a surprise as it appeared that some disassembly had been done on the unit. The CP crews cut the 16 coach consist in two due to the issue of blocking Smithe street when the entire consist is washed at one time. The Canadian consist these days isn't the traditional 'all stainless' steel as VIA continues the change over. The train is a combination of CP stainless, VIA blue and CN black & white paint schemes but at least it is now clean.

The Canadian will switch over to the VIA/CN station on Main Street this fall.

VIA's E & N ridership is booming. July saw 7,700 riders - a huge increase over July 1978 which saw ridership of 4000. So far this year 37,000 passengers have rode the line, only 8000 short of last year's full 12 month ridership. And last year saw an increase of 400% over 1977! It is doing so well that RDC-2 #9103 has been replaced by a full coach RDC-1. The two coach consist is now two RDC-1's #9064 and 9067 on the daily operation. Amazing what a little advertising will do.

VIA's Turbo Train resumed service on the Toronto-Montreal corridor at the end of July. The train had sat idled for two months due to a fire which destroyed one set. They were returned to service after safety modifications were made.

VIA

A report_from the Federal Government's Transport Ministry has proposed a formula to retain only those rail routes that generate at least 25% of costs for the route. If adopted, the result would be the end of up to 20 runs - saving about \$30 million in passenger subsidies. Among the routes that could be abandoned include the Jasper/Prince Rupert and the Edmonton/Calgary service.

VIA RS-10 #8558 arrived on The Canadian on Sunday, August 13th, spliced between red FP9A's #1409 & 1404. The VIA paint scheme is basic VIA blue, with a black roof. Cab numbers are white with large VIA in yellow on the long hood. The nose of the long hood is yellow with red VIA lettering with the yellow wrapping around the long hood. Nose of the short hood (rear) is plain black.

The 'Canadian Show Train' arrived and departed Vancouver with little notice. This was a 10 day excursion across Canada with champagne, fine dining, tours and theatre shows. For a paltry \$1285 per person, passengers are fed daily in a private dining car, treated to shows in the cabaret/theatre car, first class sleeping accommodation and then flown home. The coaches are added to the Canadian and make one day stops in Calgary and Banff, two day stops in Winnipeg and two other stops in distant destinations. The trip originates in either Toronto or Vancouver.

AMTRAK

Superliner coach #34041 arrived in Vancouver with the Pacific International on July 24th Coupled with the Superliner was a regular AMTRAK coach. The Superliner was in Vancouver to check clearances with the platform canopy roof at the VIA/CN station. The two cars departed Vancouver two days later on the PI with its regular consist of three Amfleet coaches with the Superliner on the rear but this required an extra man when wyeing the train as the conductor could not get down to throw switches from the upper level.

A bill passed by the House of Representatives and US Senate would retain the PI as part of the AMTRAK system. The bill would allow discontinuance of only long distance trains averaging less than 150 passengers or losing more than 7 cents per passenger mile and short distance trains averaging less than 80 passengers or more than 9 cents a mile. Under this formula, the overall 44,000 kilometre system would be reduced by 20%...

Carmi Sub


The battle for the CP Carmi Sub is on. The combatants are the CPR, the Province of BC and the Kettle Valley Railway Heritage Society. The CPR was granted permission to abandon the trackage in Dec. of last year by the CTC, however nothing happened until a tender for removal of the rails was awarded on July 27th this year with work to start a month later. Thoughts regarding the tourist potential of the line have been discussed for years but no action was taken until this announcement was made.

The KVRHS was formed to try and save the line and they petitioned the Provincial Government to put a 'stop order'. They have also commissioned a feasibility study together with an engineering study of the condition of the trestles and road bed on the line from Penticton to McCulloch which includes the very scenic Myra Canyon with its 16 wooden and steel trestles and a few tunnels. It should be noted that the cost of these two studies (\$40,000) has been funded by one individual, Pat Capozzi, of the wine and hotel family. The studies will be completed prior to the start of dismantling in August. At McCulloch, the proposal is to build a lodge and other tourist facilities. Servicing the locomotives and rolling stock would be done at the CPR Penticton roundhouse which includes both a turntable and a wye. A wye would have to be built at McCulloch.

The Provincial Government has remained aloof so far which is bit surprising since Premier Bill Bennett's riding includes this section of the rail line. The government has supposedly done their own feasibility study and decided it wasn't economically feasible. This study is apparently in the form of a Cabinet Report and not available to the public. Despite requests from the Society in contacting several representatives of the Government in Victoria, nobody seems to have a copy of the report. The Okanagan Tourist Association estimated that between a tourist railway operation and movie location shoots, revenue could possibly exceed \$1 million a year.

As members of the railfan community, we should do everything possible to retain this jewel in the Okanagan. Express your concerns to either Premier Bill Bennett or the Honourable Don Phillips, Minister of Economic Development, in Victoria or to the Kettle Valley RR Heritage Society % CKOY Radio, Box 100, Kelowna BC.

SQUAMISH RAILS LIFTED



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TRIVIA ANSWER

The Angels Flight Railway is a 1901 built funicular in the Bunkerhill District of Los Angeles (351 South Hill Street). Construction started 2Aug1901 and took only 120 days to build the 298' incline. It was opened to the public on 31Dec1901 by Colonel J.W. (James Ward) Eddy. In 1969 it was dismantled for "urban renewal" and in the early 1990's was relocated 1/2 block south adjacent to the California Plaza, refurbished and re-opened in 1996. The railway appeared in the 2016 film La La Land starring Emma Stone and Ryan Gosling and 2011's The Muppets Movie.
