BC FOREST DISCOVERY CENTRE TO RESTORE SHAY #1

The BC Forest Discovery Centre in Duncan, BC is restoring its narrow gauge Shay #1 that was manufactured in 1920 and brought to the Cowichan Valley as a brand new locomotive. It worked for a variety of companies in the Valley and finally belonged to the Osborn Bay wharf operation.

After it retired it was obtained by Mr. Wellburn who was the originator of the Discovery Centre and in fact provided a great deal of the artifacts for the Centre. It was operating on our park railway up until 1998 when it lost it's certification. It had sat idle for the last 18 years until we disassembled it in the fall of 2016 and sent it off to have it boiler rebuilt—or in this case, a new one built but still using some parts of the old boiler.

The new boiler is now being constructed at Geo Tech in Crofton BC. Geo tech is experienced in building and rebuilding boilers for the forest industry, pulp industry and other operations as well. Fundraising is underway and we have raised approximately \$95,000 of the \$125,000 required to finish the project.

Once completed it will become our primary locomotive to operate our narrow gauge, in the park rail operation. It is our hope to have the project complete by the fall of 2018. (J.P.)

The recognition plaque has been installed and reads as follows:

TRACK TWO

William Holt Plaque M.D. F.R.C.P.(C.)

Bill, a native Vancouverite, became fascinated with trains at an early age. He started collecting HO brass steam engines at the age of 8 before branching out to ON3 and O scale later in life. His love of modelling steam continued into his 80's. He was the volunteer prototype model checker for Pacific Fast Mail when their models were manufactured in Japan and Korea. His day job, Director of Burnaby Psychiatric Services, was demanding & fraught with drama. He built the program and ran it for over 25 years, providing much needed services for the most vulnerable Burnaby residents and their families. Retreating into his model railway workshop kept him sane and safe from politicians.

Trains were his passion, a dominant force in his life.

Today there will be a private group tour of the Northern Pacific Cannery National Historic Site. The site features exhibits, architecture, historically-inspired cuisine and the pristine wilderness surrounds that tell the story of an industry that played an integral role in BC's history. The seafood chowder is highly recommended!

Day 6, Wed. May 2: Prince Rupert

Today is a free day to explore Prince Rupert at your leisure with an optional tour of the Museum of Northern BC. Prince Rupert is famous for its wilderness, wildlife, seafood, colourful historic homes and culture.

Day 7, Thurs. May 3: Prince Rupert to Haida Gwaii

Everyone meets back at the hotel and transfers to the ferry terminal to board the 10 am daytime ferry to Skidegate. You will arrive at 5 pm and be met by your local guide and transported to Queen Charlotte City for dinner. After breakfast, your guide will pick you up at 9 am and you will start your Islands tour of Naikoon Provincial Park, Agate Beach, Tow Hill and North Beach. Guests are on their own for dinner. *(breakfast and lunch included)*

Day 9, Sat. May 5: Haida Gwaii

After breakfast, your 9 am tour begins with visiting Port Clements Settlers Museum, Yakoun River, Haida Canoe and Golden Spruce Trail. The evening is capped off with an included authentic native dinner, cooked in a local's home. This is a trip highlight with rave reviews. *(breakfast, lunch and dinner included)*

Day 10, Sat. May 6: Haida Gwaii

After breakfast, at 9 am your tour of Greater Masset begins with Delkatla Nature Sanctuary, Totem poles of old Masset, Tluu Xaada Naay Society, and the Dixon Entrance Maritime Museum. A tour of CN's new Port Mann facilities on Saturday, Oct. 1st has been arranged by Grant Ferguson. The tour will take approximately two hours and will include the Car Shop, Diesel Shop and possibly the Yard Tower. We need to confirm how many will be attending by Sept. 28th, so please call Grant at 987-5926

Canadian Pacific

CP Rail Business car #12, normally assigned to Revelstoke, is in Vancouver for repairs and winterization.

CP Rail has ordered 100 cushioned under-frame newsprint box cars from National Steel Car Corp. in Hamilton. Total value of the order is around \$3.5 million and the cars have been ordered to meet increased demands from the newsprint industry.

CP is having new food, newstand and ticket facilities constructed on the concourse of Windsor Station in Montreal. Total cost is \$500,000 and work will be complete by year end

GMD GP9 #8834 is the first E&N unit to be equipped with ditch lights

MLW S4 #7113, leased to Crown Zellerbach for May and June, was returned to CP on June 19th. However, CZ's Alco RS3 #4097 broke down again and #7113 returned to CZ on June 21st until #4097 is repaired.

CP Business Car 'Alberta' was spotted on the eastbound Canadian, east of Kamloops at 02:15 (now there's a real rail fan!) on August 29th coupled behind the F units.

The American Freedom Train coaches purchased by the B.C. Government's Travel Industry Dept., were seen passing through Kamloops on the tail end of a mixed CP freight in the very early morning of August 29th and they arrived in Vancouver later that day.

CN

CN Train #2 left Vancouver on Sept. 18th with three private coaches from New York via Montreal. The cars were the 'Shenandoah' (a sleeper in brown Pennsy paint), 'American General' (a sleeper in UP paint) and the 'Pennsylvania' (an open platform business car).

A 100 car unit sulphur train derailed west of Hope on August 30th with only 15 cars remaining on the track. The sulphur caught fire and a water bomber had to be called in to help douse the flames. Damage was estimated at \$3 million and the main line was closed for two days. According to CN, one of the causes was 'excessive speed'. A problem developed over the succeeding two weeks concerning disposal of ten million pounds of sulphur that was spilled from the wreck. The location was in 'unorganized territory' and CN initially sought permission to bury the sulphur in the dried up Popkum Lake on Crown Land but this was refused by the BC Fish and Wildlife Dept. CN then hired a salvage company to remove it by truck. This was done using 20 dump trucks but complaints poured in to the municipal office that the sulphur was being dumped on five acres of prime farmland by a creek! The salvage company stated it might be there for six months until he can sell it. Meanwhile, CN has issued a stern order requiring all train crews to adhere to speed limits throughout the system. The union has interpreted this as a 'go slow' order.

CN will have completed repairs to the Cisco Bridge by Oct. 1st. The bridge's deck caught fire after a derailment on August 4th. Fortunately the damage wasn't so severe that the bridge span had to be replaced.

BC Rail

BC Rail has reached agreement with two more construction firms: Chinook Construction and Miller Contracting, involved in the Dease Lake line when they were called off the job after Premier Bennett halted work. The settlement cost BCR almost \$3 million. Swan Wooster Engineering was hired to provide an independent assessment of of the costs incurred when the contracts were terminated early.

Ex CN heavyweight passenger car 'Alma Lake' stored at the Drake Street coach yards for the past two years has been repainted CP tuscan red and re-lettered 'Nootka Lake' for service on the Royal Hudson next year.

BC Government

The BC Department of Travel and Industry has purchased five executive coaches, the 'Preamble Cars', of the American Freedom Train at a cost of \$100,000. The coaches are complete with fittings and consist of a staff sleeper, a staff diner and generator car, two Victorian lounge cars (parlour and private office) and a observation platform press car. They will be used initially in connection with the Captain Cook Bi-Centennial Commemorations being held in 1978. They will be re-painted in the traditional CPR colours with the job being done at Railwest in Squamish by the BCR paint shop crews. The first trip that these cars will be utilized will be the 'Captain Cook Invitational' trip (to publicize the upcoming celebrations) and pulled by the Royal Hudson in the spring of 1978. The exact routing is still being finalized but it will include Eastern Canada as well as the USA.

AMTRAK

The Pacific International left Vancouver on Sunday, September 18 using old equipment to accommodate football fans from BC and northern Washington state travelling to Seattle for the NFL season opener of the Seahawks. The train had seven coaches including a diner. The F40PH engine needed a heater car as the coaches were the old steam heated cars. AMTRAK will add extra coaches to all Seahawk Sunday games.

Etc. Items

Skyline Travel has announced a rail fan trip via Amtrak to Klamath Falls, OR on Thanksgiving weekend. Details at 685-6102

A small railway museum is being organized by the City of Cranbrook through a LIP grant and a locally funded 'Project Society'. A 200 foot spur has been built next to the CP Cranbrook station and they have acquired an old CP coach which is presently being restored in the Cranbrook yard and will be outfitted with local memorabilia and CPR artifacts.

The Heritage Park in Calgary has acquired one of the old Montreal sightseeing streetcars.

DID YOU KNOW?

BC ELECTRIC #1311 AT SQUAMISH

BC Electric 1311 was bought by Ernie Plant after it was retired and he had it moved to

Squamish in late 1954. Ernie had wanted the car to be the clubhouse for the PGE Boosters railfan club. Eric Stathers, the PGE car shop superintendent, did not want it hanging around the

shop area and it was put out on the gravel spur at the north end of the Mamquam Bridge. Ernie, **Dave Wilkie, Pat Hind and Bert Mills** all worked on the car through the summers of 1955 and 1956.

The winters were not kind to the car. Dad was caretaker of the car as he lived in Squamish. There were times when he worked more on the Lillooet Sub and did not have that much time to look after the car and vandals got to it and did considerable damage. The seats were wrecked, windows broken and the car had been moved and derailed and was in danger of tipping over. It was decided by the group that the car could not be saved and it was burned on the spot and the metal sent away to scrap.

Dave Wilkie Collection - Steam on the Kinsol Trestle

Dave Wilkie's son Mike recently received an E Mail from an Ontario architect requesting the use of a Dave Wilkie photo of CNR Consolidation 2149 on a log train on the Kinsol Trestle in September 1958

"Attached are two images, one is Dave Wilkie's and the other is Elwood White's, whose estate we're also trying to reach. The reason for the two is related to the proportion of a wall mural - it's a wide but low, around 9m x 3m.

"These images, along with two others, are intended to be used as large scale wall murals for the new Canadian Senate building in Ottawa. The image will be designed into a metal-clad wall using a perforation and etching process - something we're still working out. We would like to obtain permission for the image's one-time use and discuss the terms and conditions with Public Works.

"The building was the former Ottawa train station and (the image) will be featured prominently in the large hall at the building's core. It would be an honour to include the image"



We were able to locate the large format negative in the WCRA Archives and produced several high resolution digital scans and delivered them to the client.

Incidentally the Elwood White photo mentioned is that of a steam powered passenger train-an NMRA Excursion-crossing the Kinsol Trestle in 1954. Bob Turner, Al Lill, Pat Hind and others were able to track down several photos of the runby. No Dave Wilkie photos of the passenger train have ever been unearthed as Dave was in Montana that week! The next three hours were spent walking downtown streets all over the core of the city. It was interesting to see the new articulated Bombardier cars operating with trolley poles for the most part, although a couple were seen with pantographs in use.



CPR 8905 is the only surviving Trainmaster and lives at the Canadian Railway Museum (Exporail) in Delson, QC (south of Montreal). The 8905 is s/n 2922 built in June 1956 with the only group of 20 (8901-8920) produced by CLC. The 8900 was built by FM as was the only other Canadian unit: CNR 3000 (later #2900). FM built all 107 of other Trainmasters to U.S. roads between Apr53 and June57. (FM 107 built / CLC 20 built - Total 127). Note N&W Trainmaster 'Slugs' survived in NS service with one preserved at the Reading Railroad Heritage Museum in Hamburg PA.
